### Unplug With Meaningful Community Programs

Most adults vaguely remember that “checking for messages” meant listening to an answering machine. We carried on with our days without relying on cell phones and managed just fine. But today, we are more connected than ever through our smartphones and other devices.

Our phones are so much more now — from cameras to calendars to social media connections — and truly disconnecting from them can be tough. But it's even harder for our kids to unplug because they only know life with these tiny screens. It's difficult for them to imagine life without computers, gaming devices, tablets or cell phones.

But there's great value in unplugging for children and adults, even if it's for just a short period of time. # Bluestem and CoBank Partner to Provide Funding to 3 Area Nonprofit Organizations

Bluestem Electric Cooperative, Inc., has partnered with CoBank to provide \$6,000 of monetary donations to three local charitable organizations, **COMMUNITY FOOD BASKET SERVING NORTHERN RILEY COUNTY** in Riley, the **LIGHTHOUSE FOR CHRIST** in Clay Center and the **COMMUNITY HEALTH MINISTRY** in Wamego.

The donations were a part of CoBank's Sharing Success Charitable Contribution Program for 2021. CoBank, headquartered outside of Denver, Colorado, is a cooperative bank serving agribusinesses and rural infrastructure providers such as Bluestem Electric and Farm Credit associations throughout the United States. The \$4 million fund is a cornerstone of CoBank's corporate citizenship efforts, matching donations by the bank's cooperative and other eligible customers to nonprofit organizations in their communities. Since Sharing Success was established in 2012, CoBank and its customers have together contributed more than \$56 million to groups such as volunteer fire departments, local schools and hunger relief programs.

Bluestem's Board of Trustees provided a \$1,000 donation each to the Community Food Basket Serving Northern Riley County, the Lighthouse for Christ, and the Community Health Ministry which was then matched by CoBank. Throughout ru-

## Tips for a Safe Harvest

Agriculture is the backbone of our country, and our livelihood greatly depends on the crops provided by American farmers. In addition to being one of the most labor-intensive professions, farming is also considered one of the most dangerous jobs in the U.S.

The hard work and exhaustive labor are tough but rushing the job to save time can be extremely dangerous — even deadly — when farming near electrical equipment.

Every year, we see tractors and other farming equipment accidentally collide with utility poles and power lines, causing injuries and power outages. These dangerous accidents can be avoided by looking up and around your surroundings when operating large farm machinery. If you're preparing for harvest season, please keep the following safety tips in mind:

- ▶ Maintain a 10-foot clearance around all utility equipment in all directions.
- ▶ Use a spotter and deploy flags to maintain safe distances from power lines and other electrical equipment when working in the field.
- ▶ If your equipment makes contact with an energized or downed power line, call 911 immediately and remain inside

the vehicle until the power line is de-energized. In case of smoke or fire, exit the cab by making a solid jump out of the cab (without touching it), and hop away to safety.

- ▶ Consider equipment and cargo extensions of your vehicle. Lumber, hay, tree limbs, irrigation pipes and even bulk materials can conduct electricity, so keep them out of contact with electrical equipment.

Sept. 19-25 is National Farm Health and Safety Week but practicing safety on the farm year-round yields positive results. We hope you never find yourself in a situation where farming equipment contacts power lines or poles, but if you do, follow these safety tips.

## Your Bluestem Payment Options

Bluestem Electric has six convenient payment options for our members. All members receive a standard monthly bill for their electrical use. Bills are due and payable upon receipt. We realize one method of payment does not fit every Bluestem member's needs, so we have several payment options available for your convenience. All our payment options are free.

### Auto Payment/Bank Draft



Members have the option to have payments automatically withdrawn from their bank accounts or credit/debit cards. Sign up through our online bill pay system or visit the office. Auto payments are drawn automatically each month on the due date of the bill.

### Prepaid



Bluestem Electric has a prepaid option where you pay for electricity as you go, in advance. When your account becomes low, an email or text is sent to advise you to add more to your account, much like putting fuel in your car. The meter is your "electricity tank gauge" and you will no longer receive a paper bill.

### SmartHub/Online Bill Pay



Online bill pay is also available 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. Click the "Pay Online" button on Bluestem Electric's website or follow [bluestemelectric.smarthub.coop/login.html](http://bluestemelectric.smarthub.coop/login.html). Members can also download the "Smart Hub" app from the Apple or Android marketplaces on any mobile device.

Bluestem Electric's monthly bill comes with a return envelope you can use to mail your check back to us at P.O. Box 33, Wamego, KS 66547. *\*Please allow additional time if using the Postal Service. Payment must be received in our office on or prior to due date. We DO NOT use the mailing post date for the payment date.*

You may pay by check, cash or credit/debit card at our office in Wamego. Our office is open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday-Friday, except for select holidays.

### Night Deposit Box



A night deposit box is located at our office in Wamego. Payments dropped off after 4:30 p.m. Monday-Friday will be posted the next business day. Please pay inside to avoid broken pay arrangements or disconnection.

Bluestem Electric also has budget billing for members who prefer to pay the same amount each month. Payments are set at your monthly average, making it easy to budget.
