FROM THE CEO

Saving Energy During Peak Times Benefits All

Conserving electricity during peak energy use times not only lowers your monthly bill, but it can also benefit our entire community.

"Peak times"

refers to periods of the day when the demand for electricity is highest. For example early mornings when people are getting ready for work or school and evenings when families return home, cook dinner and unwind with electronics. When everyone uses energy at the same time, it adds pressure on the electric grid.

Bluestem Electric Cooperative works around the clock to ensure that electricity flows to your home whenever you need it. Behind the scenes, an enormous and intricate system is at work — one of the most complex machines in the world: the U.S. power grid. The grid is made up of three major interconnections that span the country, each managing supply and demand through regional authorities to keep the lights on and our economy running smoothly.

Electricity comes from a diverse mix of sources: hydropower, natural gas, coal, solar, wind, nuclear and more. Some power plants can respond quickly to spikes in demand, while others are less flexible. Once energy is generated, it travels through high-voltage transmission lines to local utilities, like Bluestem Electric, which then delivers it to your home or business through distribution power lines.

When electricity demand surges during peak times, it's more expensive to generate or purchase power. If supply can't keep up, the risk of outages increases. That's why using less energy during peak hours is more important than ever. It not only eases strain on the grid but also helps you save money.

So how can you "beat the peak"? Start by adjusting your thermostat a few degrees during peak hours. Smart thermostats can automate this for you. Delay using energy-hungry appliances like ovens, clothes washers and dishwashers until later in the evening. Charging your electric vehicle overnight instead of right after you get home can also help.

Small actions taken by many households can lead to big results. When we all work together to reduce energy use during peak times, we protect our power grid, help control costs, and ensure reliable electricity for our communities.



ENERGY EFFICIENCY

Take advantage of "shoulder months," which refer to the transitional periods between peak heating and cooling seasons. During the fall, these milder weeks typically occur between September and November. Shoulder months offer a great opportunity to reduce home energy consumption as the need for extensive heating or cooling is reduced. Look for simple ways to boost indoor comfort without running your heating and cooling system. Use ceiling fans and open windows on breezy days to ventilate your home. On cooler days, add a layer of clothing and avoid running the heat.

Navigating Your New Electric Bill

Starting in September your bill will have a new look. You will find the same important information with some new features to make managing your account even easier.



TOTAL AMOUNT DUE: This section summarizes total amount due and due date. Automatic payment would be indicated if you participate in this program.

YOUR ACCOUNT INFORMATION: Your billing date, account number and account name are listed here.

BILLING SUMMARY: This section shows a summary of the current account balance. It takes the total of all the charges for the current bill, adds the balance forward, and displays the total amount due for the account.

CONTACT INFORMATION: Ways to contact us about your bill or account are clearly noted on your bill.

MESSAGE CENTER: Important information will be listed here, which may be unique to your account or provide news about the cooperative.

GRAPH: The usage history graph displays your usage history over the past 13 months. It compares your most recent average monthly use to the same time period as the year prior.

CURRENT CHARGES: A detailed listing of the charges will be listed here.

PAYMENT STUB: Return the bottom portion of your bill with your payment, especially if you have multiple accounts. This ensures that Bluestem applies the correct payment amount to your account(s).

YOUR SAFETY MATTERS

BE PREPARED THIS HARVEST **SEASON!**

Your electric cooperative reminds all farmers and farm workers to have a safe harvest season.



LOOK UP AND LIVE

Always be aware of overhead power lines when operating tall equipment like grain augers and combines.



If your equipment contacts a power line, stay inside the cab and call danger like a fire. If you must exit, jump clear without touching any part of the equipment, and hop away keeping feet together.



As you work, be aware of overhead power lines. Always maintain at least 20 feet of clearance from power lines and electrical equipment.



Confirm your cellphone number is listed on your account by calling the BEC office.

Visit https:// notifications. crc.coop/?uid=6727 or scan the QR code.



Accept the user agreement and complete an online form to create a text reporting account.

You will receive a text verification code on your cellphone. Enter the code into the form to confirm your account. Click submit. You are now ready to report an outage at your location(s).

If you have multiple accounts, you can add keywords based on service location (e.g. home, well, shop, irrigation, etc.). Use these keywords when texting outages (e.g., outage home, outage well) to help BEC crews to expedite restoration times.

SAFETY TIP

MAKE A PLAN. Talk with your family about where you will go and how you will stay in touch during an emergency.



BUILD AN EMERGENCY SUPPLY KIT.

Gather supplies like water,

non-perishable food, flashlights, batteries, medications and first-aid supplies.

STAY INFORMED. Sign up for local weather alerts and updates from your cooperative.



TIPS TO AVOID

Solar energy is rising in popularity — and so are solar scams. If a salesperson knocks on your door promising free solar panels at zero cost or that you'll never have to pay your energy bill again, it's likely a scam. If you're interested in solar for your home, do your research, get multiple quotes from reputable, licensed providers, contact your electric co-op before installation, and take your time to ensure a smooth process. **SOURCE: FEDERAL TRADE COMMISSION**



BE AWARE OF OVERHEAD POWER LINES, UTILITY POLES AND OTHER ELECTRICAL EQUIPMENT WHILE HUNTING.



Keep clear of electrical equipment.

Never shoot at or near power lines or insulators. Be aware of power line and equipment locations where you hunt.

Never place deer stands on utility poles. Never place decoys on power lines or other electrical equipment.
